Big Win for Children and Families!

The Government of Canada was issued a fourth non-compliance order on Feb 1, 2018 for not following through on remedies ordered from the Canadian Human Rights Tribunal (CHRT). In the landmark 2016 case, Canada was found to be discriminatory in funding provisions for indigenous children.

The Feb 1 ruling outlined that the remedies are not only legally binding, but vital because it deals with the mass removal of children; a

practice which must be stopped.

The CHRT ordered that the Government of Canada must pay for costs to provide support to families wherever possible to prevent children from going into government care at actual costs. "This ruling is a victory for children" said Mary Teegee. "Now we will have the resources to keep our children where they belong, in their communities with loved ones."

Resilience in Prevention and Response

Health Research Grants

New Health Research Opportunities Coming to CSFS Communities

CSFS has been very successful with our applications to the Canadian Institutes of Health Research. With an overall success rate of 15% of applications being funded, CSFS submitted and was approved for 4 projects! The four grants include studies on women's health, spirituality, exercise and lung health.

The women's health study will aim to increase access to cervical cancer screening through addressing barriers such as geographic location, personal fears, and mistrust of the health system. There are plans to develop an HPV test where women can collect and test themselves.

A number of community meetings with knowledge holders will be carried out to gather knowledge about the role of spirituality in holistic approaches to health. Interventions identified by the knowledge holders will be tested to determine their impact on spiritual and physical health.

An education and exercise program will be developed for CSFS member Nation adults with chronic lung disease. In addition, the study will examine the physical activity of adult community members while developing and sharing educational materials on lung disease.

Finally, lung function testing will occur in our member communities to screen for Chronic Pulmonary Disease (COPD). Testing is currently only available in Prince George by physician referral. This study will indicate if COPD is underreported, while also examining COPD in regard to relationships between inhaled pollutants and symptoms among others.

Child Welfare Governance

Developing Community Based Prevention Services

Further to the update presented at the CSFS Annual General Assembly in early September 2017 hosted by the Nadleh Whut'en, the Child Welfare Community Engagement Team have visited and facilitated 11 of the 13 Communities this past Quarter (Fall & Winter 2017). The focus of the first round of community visits was to gather perspectives regarding child welfare matters; identify solutions to the existing system and to have an overall information exchange on designing a Child Welfare System that reflects the Indigenous ways of doing things, especially Carrier and Sekani ways.

As Round 1 is nearing completion, the Team is preparing summary reports of the sessions and will soon be coordinating the next round of meetings to meet with the communities to ensure the information received to date is what the community shared to the Engagement Team during 2017. In addition to community meetings, the Engagement Team also relied upon the Youth Forum that was held in Prince George in November 2017 where we heard from former children in care's experiences.

While the Engagement Team is meeting with the CSFS Member Communities, the Child & Family Services Executive Director is also working with the Institute of Fiscal Studies & Democracy who will be assisting in the further development of Models, Service Plans, and the costing of the jurisdiction, management and service delivery of child welfare framework plans.

The Team has already had a number of Think Tank Planning Sessions to further develop the

Framework, building the model based on past work, establishing short and long term plans, reviewing capacity building and training needs, enhancing or re-establishing the Community Wellness Teams and how to continue to report to the CSFS Member Communities. One of the long term communication goals is to have an overall Child Welfare Symposium to review the materials to date. This session is expected to be held sometime in the late spring or Early Summer 2018.

The Team will be reaching out to each of the communities shortly to set up the next round of meetings plus to meet with the remaining communities not yet met with (Nee Tahi Buhn and this week Lake Babine).

60's Scoop Compensation

What the settlement announcement means for BC residents

Class action suits to address the hardships faced by 60's scoop survivors have filed against the Government of Ontario, and the Government of British Columbia. The Government of Canada has responded by promising an investment of up to \$50 million to establish a Foundation to enable change and reconciliation, a minimum of \$500 million and maximum of \$750 million in individual compensation for Status Indians and Inuit, and \$74 million for legal fees.

In British Columbia, the National Assembly of First Nations (AFN) has shared information on the process. There are still several steps before the claim process to obtain compensation begins. First. the terms

of the settlement agreement must be finalized. Second, the proposed settlement must be approved by the federal and Ontario courts. It has been estimated that it will take till the summer or fall of 2018 for the settlement to be finalized and for the claim process to begin. When the claim process begins, the websites listed below will provide details on how to make claims for compensation. There will be a deadline to file claims. To make sure that potential claimants do not miss any deadlines, the AFN strongly recommends that individuals regularly monitor the web sites at www.callkleinlawyers.com or the Ontario class action website www.sixtiesscoopclaim.com.

Burns Lake Early Years Centre


Fun and learning during the most important years
